Aims & Objectives

This module introduces students to economic development, by giving an overview of domestic and international topics relevant to developing nations. The objective is not to give an overview of theory, but to apply what has been learned in microeconomics and macroeconomics courses to analyze the experience of developing nations. At the end of this module you should be able to make an argument making use of the economics you have learned in other modules. In particular, when analyzing or making an argument, you should be aware of causality.

Teaching Modes

There will no lecture notes. However I will follow "Economics of Development in Asia" (2nd Ed) by J. Dowling and Ma. Valenzuela for the concepts

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and theory, while in depth discussions will come from "The Development Economics Reader" by G. Secondi. Lectures will be webcasted, though I hope you will not use this to skip coming to lectures, as your participation in lectures is essential for the smooth working of the lecture. I will post the slides online after the lecture, though you can have an idea what will be covered in the syllabus.

In tutorials we will discuss articles which I will post, Wednesdays. Each tutorial will be divided into 7 groups of 2 to 5 students. Each group will take turns in presenting and discussing the articles, according to the following schedule. One group is assigned to present the main points of the articles (P), another group will be assigned to discuss/comment on the presentation (D), while the remaining groups should join in the discussion, but are responsible for commenting in other tutorials blogs (http://blog.nus.edu.sg/tfreire/).

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Description of Role

Leader/Editor: This student is in charge of organizing the final product of the project, be it a paper, a presentation, etc. That doesn't mean technical details, but of making sure that the project meets the standards set out by the instructor (often as a rubric), plus any extras stipulated by the group. These standards generally include punctuality and completeness.

Recorder/Secretary: This person takes notes whenever the group meets and keeps track of group data/sources/etc. This person distributes these notes to the rest of the group highlighting sections relevant for their parts of the project.

Checker: Someone needs to double-check data, bibliographic sources, or graphics for accuracy and correctness

Spokesperson/Press Secretary/Webmaster: This person would be responsible for the technical details of the final product and would be ready to summarize the group's progress and findings to the instructor and to other groups.

Reflector: This student will listen to what others say and explain it back in his or her own words, asking the original speaker if the interpretation is correct.
